## Intimate Partner Violence Among Youth

Our panel presentations and discussions concluded with a look at addressing the issues of intimate partner violence among youth. This panel was conducted by Ivan Juzang (MEE Productions, Inc), Leah Aldridge (Commission on Assaults Against Women) and Byron Hurt (God Bless The Child Productions).

#### **IVAN JUZANG**

- · A few themes I've seen emerge in my work.
  - Young men respect women who wait.
  - Men have their own issues around sexual health care.
- If you're working with youth, you must add "communicator" to your title.
- Hip-Hop is an oral-based culture, so how are you persuasive with an oral-based culture?
- How do we use media to our advantage?
- How do we use peer-to-peer communication?
- How do adults talk to youth? Have adults earned their respect?
- · How, as a community, do we support parenting?

#### **LEAH ALDRIDGE**

- People don't need to wait until they're 21 years old to experience domestic violence. Young people experience it in their partner relationships and often these are the best relationships they have.
- We have to be prepared to address the needs of our youth holistically before we can even being to address healthy relationships.

- We have to think of and respond to their economic, health, physical, social, housing needs, to name just a few.
- We can also help them learn how to criticize media so they can deconstruct it then make consumer choices based on a deeper understanding of media.


#### **BYRON HURT**

- "Men, do you do anything on a daily basis to protect yourself, on a daily basis, against sexual assault or rape?" This question changed my life.
- · For the past ten years, I've been on a real journey.
- The more I've learned, the more I challenged other men, the more I had to question what I heard in Hip-Hop.
- I want to inspire men to speak out against anything to do with misogyny, homophobia, ultra-masculinity. As men, we can do something about it!





## FILM PRESENTATIONS






